Community Corner



SPF: Sun Protection is Fundamental

Swimming in the neighborhood pool, hanging on tight as you are pulled across the lake behind a boat, golfing at your favorite course, not to mention cheering on your favorite baseball team are all fun-filled activities that comprise the summer months. But those activities can also put you at risk for skin cancer.

August is summer sun safety awareness month. It is estimated that 3.5 million cases of basal and squamous cell skin cancer is diagnosed in the United States each year. These types of cancers mainly occur where your skin is directly exposed to the sun, like your face, neck, lips, ears and even the back side of your hands.

Protecting your skin from being overexposed to the sun can reduce your chances of getting skin cancer. The American Cancer Society suggests the best way to avoid overexposure is to stay in the shade, but sometimes this cannot be avoided. They suggest when you know you will be directly in the sun to "Slip, Slop, Slap and Wrap."

- * Slip on a shirt
- * Slop on sunscreen
- * Slap on a hat
- **★** Wrap on sunglasses

Basal cell carcinomas are usually the easiest form of skin cancer to treat and are the least likely to spread. If they are not treated, they can cause extensive damage to tissue and bone surrounding the disease. Squamous cell carcinomas are usually found easier by an individual or through a skin examination by a dermotologist. Signs of these possible skin cancer types can include raised, reddish patches; pink growths with raised edges, small pink or red translucent, shiny bumps; or changes in the size, shape or color of a mole.

The most dangerous type of skin cancer is Melanoma, which is more likely to spread to the lymph nodes or other parts of the body. Detected early, melanoma has a much better chance of responding to treatment. It's important to know that melanoma also can appear initially in the eyes, under toenails or in mucosal tissues around the head or genitals.

The American Cancer Society notes the ABCDE rule is another guide to the usual signs of skin cancer when it comes to melanoma.

- ✓ **A is for Asymmetry:** One half of a mole or birthmark does not match the other.
- ✓ B is for Border: The edges are irregular, ragged, notched, or blurred.
- ✓ C is for Color: The color is not the same all over and
 may include different shades of brown, black or some
 times patches of pink, red, or blue.
- ✓ **D is for Diameter:** The spot is larger than ¼ inch across (the size of a pencil eraser), although spots can sometimes be smaller.
- ✓ **E is for Evolving:** The mole is changing in size, shape, or color.

If you see any spots or growths with any of these features, or anything else you notice to be unusual, it's important you discuss your findings with your doctor. As with other cancers, early detection is important.

The St. Jude ABCs of Cancer

A cancer diagnosis is frightening for anyone, but it is especially scary for a child. The Child Life Specialists at St. Jude Children's Hospital has created unique ways for children and teens to understand their illness while expressing their feelings in healthy ways—through play, writing and art.

St. Jude has produced "The St. Jude ABCs of Cancer," a collection of poems and artwork crafted by the young heroes who are patients at St. Jude. We intend to publish a portion of the ABC's in each of the upcoming editions of *Call to the 'Pen*. The collection is taken directly from what each of the patients wrote, making no corrections to their writing.

This month's letter "D" was written by Diana, an 8-year old battling Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia.



Childhood acute lymphoblastic leukemia is a cancer in which the bone marrow makes too many immature lymphocytes (white blood cells). This type of cancer usually gets worse quickly if it is not treated.
